- (d) Enforcement penalties are not used in the year that they are collected, they are deposited into a special fund for future years.
- (e) Permits generally have a five-year renewal cycle. Therefore, the county can be expected to process at least this number of permits every five years.
- (f) Miami-Dade County has ordinances that cover mobile source emissions. However, it has made a policy decision to enforce more recent state regulations instead.
- (g) "Additional Pollutants" include those for which there are no definite state standards. These pollutants may be regulated by state law under a nuisance standard.
