The Heritage of Leadership Recognition Society honors individuals who are preeminent graduates who have assumed leadership positions on national and international levels and distinguished themselves in legal, governmental, academic and corporate sectors. They labored to improve the administration of justice and received the highest commendations for contributions to the profession and service to education, civic, charitable and cultural causes.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

To be selected for inclusion in the Heritage of Leadership an individual must:

- 1. Have been a graduate of the University of Florida College of Law or must have had direct involvement in the college of law in a very significant way.
- 2. Have demonstrated his or her dedication to the principles of duty and service to the public, to improve the administration of justice and to advance the science of jurisprudence.
- Have been actively engaged in the profession as a practicing lawyer, judicial officer, teacher in the legal field, or serving in the capacity directly involving legal jurisprudence, or otherwise have made a major contribution of service to the public welfare.
- 4. Have been of high ethical character.

As a general principle, it is the preference of the College of Law Board of Trustees Heritage of Leadership Committee to recommend for induction into the Heritage of Leadership nominees who are deceased. The Committee recognizes, however, that in exceptional circumstances, induction of retired living nominees may be warranted, assuming the above-referenced criteria are satisfied.

A slate of inductees is selected by the Heritage of Leadership Committee, which presents the slate for discussion and approval to the full membership of the Law Center Association, Inc. Board of Trustees.

REUBIN O'DONOVAN ASKEW

1928-2014, Class of 1956



As prosecuting attorney, state legislator, governor of Florida for eight years, chairman of two federal commissions, and ambassador and member of the president's Cabinet, Reubin O'Donovan Askew served at every level of American government.

Born in Muskogee, Oklahoma, on Sept. 11, 1928, Reubin Askew was the youngest of six children. As he often expressed it, he "came from a family of very modest means – which is a nice way of saying poor." In 1937, his family moved to Pensacola, Florida, where he entered public schools of Escambia County.

Askew bookended his career with the University of Florida. He graduated from UF Law in 1956. He retired from politics in 1994 and established UF's Reubin O'D. Askew Institute on Politics and Society. The institute brought Floridians together to discuss critical issues and served as a forum for statewide issues and promoted civic engagement.

Upon graduation from high school in 1946, Askew entered the Army and served in the U.S. Army paratroopers. Discharged at the rank of sergeant, he entered Florida State University on the G.I. Bill and served as president of the student body. After earning a degree in public administration, he entered the Air Force as a second lieutenant. He served in Europe and returned to study at UF Law, where he was president of his law school class and executive editor of the Florida Law Review. In 1956, he received his law degree and returned to Pensacola. He continued in the Air Force Reserve and rose to the rank of captain.

Askew's public service began immediately after entering the bar as prosecuting attorney in Escambia County where his success led to his election to the Florida House in 1958 and the Florida Senate in 1962. He served 12 years in the Florida Legislature. In 1970, Askew was elected governor of Florida and served two successive four year terms, gaining recognition as a practical and progressive reformer, a man of integrity with firm convictions who believed fervently in the need to make government work.

The Askew years have been widely characterized as years

of achievement, reform, and successful transition for Florida. A study prepared by George Weeks at Harvard University named Askew as one of the 10 greatest American governors of the 20th century. Among his accomplishments were pushing through nominating commissions for state judges, initiating a corporate income tax and racially integrating state institutions. He proposed the "Sunshine Amendment," which, when adopted, resulted in a more open government.


Askew served as keynote speaker at the Democratic National Convention in 1972. In 1979, President Jimmy Carter appointed Askew the United States Trade Representative. As a member of the

president's Cabinet and as an ambassador, Askew functioned as the president's principal advisor and the nation's principal spokesman on international trade.

As United States Trade Representative, Askew earned recognition worldwide for his forceful and articulate advocacy of a more open, fairer and expanded world trading system. He was recognized domestically for his candor, fairness and for his strong support of improved productivity and increased competitiveness for the American economy.

Upon resigning from the Cabinet at the expiration of the president's term, Askew returned to Miami to practice law. In 1984, he ran for president.

Askew died March 13 in Tallahassee at the age of 85. He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Donna Lou, his daughter, Angela, and his son, Kevin.



Public servant for the ages

ROBERTA FULTON FOX

1943-2009, Class of 1967



A powerful advocate for gender equality and the protections of rights for otherwise voiceless communities, Roberta Fulton Fox (JD 67) dedicated her life and her career to fighting for underdogs. Whether representing women, children or African-Americans during the civil rights movements, she was a powerful force both in and out of

was a powerful force both in and out of the courtroom.

Fox was born Nov. 25, 1943, to a sea captain and a masseuse in Philadelphia. Around the age of 12, she moved to Coral Gables where she graduated from Coral Gables High School and then pursued her bachelor's degree from the University of Florida. Her love of the TV show about a criminal defense lawyer, "Perry Mason," drew her to law, and she returned to UF to study in the field. Fox graduated UF Law as one of only a handful of women in her class.

The legal field was a tough one for a woman in the 1960s. Law firms shunned her, but she eventually signed on with

Migrant Legal Services where she campaigned for civil rights and farm worker labor issues. The job opened her eyes to social injustices and launched her career in public service.

"She was a pioneer for women in the field at a time when they weren't taken seriously," husband Mike Gold said.

She went on to work with Legal Services in Miami where she targeted issues affecting the elderly. She met her future husband in court while representing anti-Vietnam war protesters. Together, they opened The Law Offices of Gold & Fox PA.

In 1974, she was active on the Governor's Commission on Marriage and Family. Under Gov. Reubin Askew (JD 56), the commission aimed to fix problems associated with domestic violence and marital-asset laws. As the only female member of the commission, Fox fought for equitable distribution of property.

When a state legislator made misogynistic comments on the floor of the Florida House, Fox did something about it. She ran and won the seat, defeating the incumbent in an upset of less than 100 votes. She was re-elected twice.

Fox was most proud of her 10 years of service in the

Legislature and will be remembered for work protecting children's ability to testify via video in abuse cases, mandating background checks for anyone working with children, and her campaign to publicize the process of choosing state appellate court judges.

Fox also marched for passage of the Equal Rights Amendment. After the amendment failed, Fox told supporters: "We have nothing to be ashamed of today. We all understood the Senate is a dark place, a secret place... You must now give it everything you have and send in reinforcements."

Fox took her own advice. Elected in 1982 to the Florida Senate, Fox

was instrumental in passing the Florida Equal Education Opportunity Act in 1984 that enforced non-discrimination policies in the school systems.

In 1988, Fox joined the Clemency Review Board, where she served for seven years on a panel that reviewed women accused of murdering their partners.

During her career, she also represented welfare workers after they were unlawfully fired, fought for abortion rights, and campaigned for pay equality as a member of the National Organization for Women.

Fox succumbed to breast cancer at her home in Coral Gables on Aug. 9, 2009, leaving behind her husband, a stepdaughter and two nephews whom she considered her children.

She will be remembered as a wife, a feminist, a humanitarian and for her commitment to the University of Florida. "She was a Gator through and through," Gold said.

S. AUSTIN PEELE

1938-2011, Class of 1963



Since the seventh grade, Shuler Austin Peele (JD 63) knew he wanted to study law at the University

of Florida. He believed every person had a story to tell and he wanted to give them the voice to do so. He found that when he took a genuine interest in others, they were willing to talk with him – not because of attorney-client relations, but as friends. These relationships continued to motivate him 48 years after he began practicing.

Peele graduated from Hillsborough High School in 1956 and went on to study English at Wofford College in Spartanburg, SC. He received his JD in 1963 from UF Law. After graduation,

he joined Jopling & Darby, which later became Darby & Peele. Although his title said he practiced business law, he considered himself a "dirt lawyer" because he primarily handled real estate, land disputes and other matters dealing with property rights.

Colleagues, however, considered him an oldfashioned lawyer. "He would do anything you

> needed up to the Supreme Court," said partner Herbert Darby. "He could handle anything."

Peele was a valuable member of The Florida Bar and served on the Designation Coordination Committee that led to the establishment of the Florida Board Certification Plan. He loved and represented the Gators throughout his career and each year organized and led trips to an away game for members of the board and other alumni.

Throughout his career, Peele

was actively involved in the Lake City Bar, the 3rd Circuit Bar and Columbia County church and civic organizations. Peele worked with Darby & Peele until his death on Nov. 20, 2011. He was 73 years old. He is survived by his wife of 52 years, Fredda Thompson Peele, and his three daughters, Peggy, Laura and Mary Katherine.
