### Forum on historical slave revolt

As a prelude to an early 2001 local theatrical production of "The Amistad Case," the law school's Center for the Study of Race and Race Relations will sponsor a free public discussion on the historical 1839 event Dec. 6 at the Acrostown Repertory Theater, 619 South Main St., at 6:30 p.m.

Featured speakers from the law school will include **Fletcher N. Baldwin Jr.**, Chesterfield Smith Professor of Law; Assistant Professor of Law **Pedro Malavet**; and **Rahim Reed**, Assistant Dean and Center Director. Also participating will be **Robert L. Woods**, former director of UF's graduate minority programs and a doctoral candidate at the University of Missouri at Columbia studying African-American imagery in the American media.

A recent major film recounted the true story of African slaves shipped to Havana, Cuba, in 1839, and their revolt to take over control of the schooner, Amistad. Former President John Quincy Adams argued on behalf of the slaves' fight to regain freedom in an 1841 case before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Topics to be discussed at the forum include the Cuban slave trade, constitutional law in Africa and the U.S., race relations and their effect on American law in the 1800s and now, and African-American culture and its depiction in the media.

## No Need for Recount Historic presidential election makes law school big winner

Thanks to one of the nation's heaviest and longest news media blitzes in recent years, the University of Florida and its Fredric G. Levin College of Law have been declared big winners in connection with the Bush-Gore presidential election turmoil.

Starting Wednesday, Nov. 8, the day after national voting day, and continuing through this past weekend (Nov. 25-26), national and international news media representatives counted on UF experts on a daily basis to add expertise, interpretation and analysis.

Two prominent national spokesmen have been Interim Dean **Jon Mills** and Professor **Joe Little**, with Associate Dean for Academic Affairs **Mike Seigel** providing assistance. Members of UF's Political Science Department also were quoted extensively.

**John Lester**, UF's Associate Director of News and Public Affairs, commented that, "this is quite a time in U.S. political history, and we're delighted UF experts are playing a role in it."

Law school Communications Director **Stan Huguenin** estimates more than 300 media representative calls were handled Nov. 8-Nov. 26, "and thanks to the tireless efforts of Dean Mills and Professor Little, including nights and weekends, we made a tremendous number of news media outlets happy and gained valuable additional recognition for one of the country's top law schools and universities."

**Dowd appointed Chesterfield Smith Professor of Law**

Professor **Nancy E. Dowd**, a nationally recognized legal scholar specializing in workplace and family issues, has been appointed a Chesterfield Smith Professor of Law.

In making the announcement, Interim Dean Jon Mills said, "We are very pleased to honor another one of our outstanding faculty members with this appointment. Professor Dowd is a talented teacher, as well as a noted author and scholar, and extremely deserving of this honor."

The Chesterfield Smith Professorships were established through an initial \$100,000 from the Holland & Knight law firm, plus \$50,000 donated by individuals within the firm, as well as Holland & Knight clients and friends of Smith. Additional donations and matching state funds fully funded the professorship at more than \$300,000. Smith, a 1948 UF law graduate, is a past president of the American Bar Association and The Florida Bar, and former Holland & Knight board chairman.

Professors **Michael W. Gordon** and **Fletcher N. Baldwin Jr.** also hold Smith Professorships, which provide salary supplements and support for scholarly activities.

Dowd, a UF Foundation Research Professor and Trustee Research Fellow, specializes in work-family issues, gender and workplace law, and civil rights law. She began her academic career at Suffolk University Law School, after clerking for Judge Robert Sprecher on the U.S. Court of Appeals and practicing labor and employment law with the Boston firm of Choate, Hall and Stewart. In 1987-88, she received a Rockefeller Foundation grant for a project entitled, "The Work-Family Conflict: Restructuring the Workplace."

She is author of *Redefining Fatherhood* (New York University Press, July 2000), and *In Defense of Single Parent Families* (New York University Press, 1997), as well as leading law review articles.

Twice in the '90s, Dowd received the Clara Gehan Award for Advancement of Women's Issues from UF's Law Association for Women. As a UF faculty member, she earned a Professional Excellence Program Award, a Teaching

Improvement Program Award, and was voted a College of Law Teacher of the Year. She is a member of the American Association of University Professors' Subcommittee on Status of Women in the Academic Profession.

"It is an honor and a privilege to hold this professorship in light of the distinguished career of Chesterfield Smith," Dowd said. "I deeply appreciate the support and recognition of my work by the College of Law."

Dowd is a frequent guest lecturer and panelist. She spoke twice in November, to a faculty seminar at Marquette University Law School on her new book, *Redefining Fatherhood*, and at a conference on "family law at the millennium" cosponsored by University of Pennsylvania Law School and the Pennsylvania Bar Institute.

Dowd received her B.A. with high honors from the University of Connecticut, her M.A. from the University of Illinois, and her J.D. from Loyola

## Survey by law school's Legal Technology Institute shows impact of technology on legal profession

Law firm clients across the country are increasing their requests for electronic access to case-related information, but the legal profession is not yet meeting those needs.

And while the profession is rapidly increasing use of technology in the everyday practice of law, there is widespread recognition among attorneys of related problems — including need for additional personnel, training, help desk functions and costs.

Those are two of the key findings in a national Application Service Providers (ASP) survey of more than 26,500 legal professionals conducted by the Legal Technology Institute (LTI) of the University of Florida Levin College of Law.

“We are encouraged by results showing 90 percent of the legal profession uses the Internet at work, almost two-thirds have Internet Web sites, and 50 percent provide remote access to firms’ office networks,” reports **Andrew Z. Adkins III**, LTI director and survey project manager. “But, knowledge and use of the new and cost-effective ASP system, designed to deliver software to the desktop, is disappointingly low.”

Other survey findings, according to Adkins:

- A high number of legal professionals do not use computerized calendaring.
- Lawyers are becoming more mobile, and working from remote locations.
- About 36 percent of the legal profession use portable computers.
- Almost 40 percent of survey respondents say that having a “computer staff” in a large law firm provides a competitive advantage.
- Almost one-third of small law firms outsource their computer support.

Recipients of the survey came from random lists provided by the American Bar Association, Association of Legal Administrators, American Corporate Counsel Association and through a summer edition of *Law Technology News*, an American Lawyer Media publication. Of those responding, 60 percent are attorneys, 21 percent administrators, and five percent information technology staff. About 70 percent of the respondents are from private law firms, 15 percent in corporate law depart-

ments, and five percent from government law sections.

The ASP study is sponsored by iManage, casecentral.com, eAttorney Inc, eJur Inc., ELF Technologies, Elite.com, Gavel & Gown Inc., iLumin Inc., Microsoft Corp., NETwork ALternatives Inc., Network Technology Group, Niku for Legal, Union Square Technology Group LLC, RealLegal.com, and West Group.

Adkins explained the primary concept of ASP is that one “rents” software applications over the Internet on a subscription basis, rather than having to invest heavy capital up-front. He said ASP delivers software applications to the desktop using high-speed Internet connections and an industry standard Web browser. Computer industry developers, integrators and consultants are providing technologies, products and services using the new ASP model, but the legal profession as a whole is unaware of its existence and application.

“Respondents who are familiar with ASP, however, indicate main benefits of using such a system include low initial cost, and low technology investment for a firm or sole practitioner,” Adkins continued.

He also is chair of the American Bar Association TECHSHOW 2001.



## Professor backs wheelchair users in *Florida Law Review*

Future court decisions should ensure wheelchair users enjoy lines of sight comparable to those of the general public, even when standing, and architects and franchisers, not just building owners, should be held accountable for compliance.

That’s the opinion of **Adam A. Milani**, Assistant Professor of Legal Writing and Analysis at Mercer University School of Law, Macon, Ga., as published in a recent issue of the nationally distributed *Florida Law Review*.

Milani is one of 11 legal authorities contributing to recent issues of *Florida Law Review*, published four times a year. The publication includes analysis and comment on topical legal issues by nationally recognized scholars and current UF law students, and is edited by **Russell Koonin**, a third year student from Miami.

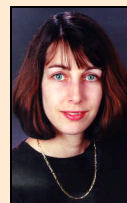
