'Citizenship or Bondage'

"Citizenship or Bondage: Women's Work, Law & the Constitution" — an historical reenactment and moot court oral argument on gender lawyering and prostitution — will be held Thursday, Oct. 24, 7 p.m., University Auditorium (main UF campus).

The event is being organized by Associate Professor **Danaya Wright** and sponsored by the American Bar Association-Law Student Division, Moot Court and Law Association for Women (LAW) as part of the UF Center for Women's Studies and Gender Research's 25th anniversary celebration symposium.

Study Abroad Through UFLaw Exchange Programs

UFLaw students can expand their legal education at the University of Montpellier (France), Johann Wolfgang Goethe-Universitat (Germany), and Leiden University (Netherlands) through ABA-approved Exchange Programs exclusively for them. Applications are available in Student Affairs, and due no later than 4 p.m. Friday, Sept. 20.

Montpellier University (France)

Montpellier University in the sunny region of southern France is only six miles from the Mediterranean coast and around 60 miles from the Pyrenees mountains. Its Faculty of Law, established in the 12th Century, took part in drafting the Napoleonic Civil Code, which still applies in France and serves as a model for all countries governed by Civil Law. The Faculty of Law offers a wide choice of subjects in law and political science, and is engaged in international relationships that comprise more than 70 nationalities, mostly European.

Johann Wolfgang Goethe-Universitat (Germany)

Frankfurt — a global center of international banking, busy trade center and major conference site — is home for more than 400 banks, the European Monetary Institute and one of the most important European stock exchanges. Johann Wolfgang Goethe-Universitat is one of 10 universities in Frankfurt, with 35,443 students from 117 different nationalities. More than 170 courses are taught in 21 departments.

Leiden University (Netherlands)

For more than 420 years, Leiden University

in the Netherlands has influenced the city and helped create the perfect college town. There is a great variety of cultural, recreational and athletic activities. Frequent and fast trains carry passengers to other main Dutch centers of culture and amusement, such as Amsterdam, Utrecht, Rotterdam and The Hague. Leiden University is a modern institution of higher learning that attracts professors and staff from around the world. It offers more than 50 courses in International Law, including Public International Law and European Community Law. The UF-Leiden Exchange enables law students to spend a semester overseas while paying UF tuition. Only five UF students are chosen to participate each semester, so sign up as soon as possible.

Participants in French and German programs must be fluent in language of instruction. (There are opportunities via the host institution to acquire proficiency.) Deans Report on 'State of the College'

UFLaw Dean **Jon Mills**, Associate Dean **Michael Friel** and others spoke to faculty on the "State of the College" last week.

Friel advised that the budget now being finalized will be very similar to last year's conservative financial approach.

Self-Study Committee Chair **Alyson Flournoy** said efforts by Professor **Jeff Davis'** Strategic Planning Committee are proving vital in preparing for the pending sabbatical inspection by the American Bar Association and American Association of Law Schools, which are now placing more emphasis on the "big picture rather than mind-numbing detail."

Dean Mills praised the quality of students, faculty, staff and alumni, and said the college's focus this year is on opportunity — through hiring, the planning necessitated by the ABA/AALS visit and new and renovated facilities.

"The college has a unique chance to define itself at this time by building a truly outstanding facility that will finally be worthy of the quality of the people here. This will be a signature building at UF, and the true entrance to the university," said Mills, who added that an architect should be chosen in the next few weeks.
