### Career Services Assistant Dean Calvert Hanson Begins Today

Linda S. Calvert Hanson — a former assistant dean for professional development at Florida Coastal School of Law in Jacksonville, legal educator and practicing lawyer — takes over as head of the Levin College of Law's Center for Career Services today.

"Linda is one of our graduates, and has extensive experience in education and the law," said Dean Robert Jerry. "She brings a great deal of practical knowledge, expertise and energy to this position, and already has a keen understanding of what students need and employers are looking for."

Hanson was recognized for her pro bono work and community involvement this June when the Jacksonville Women Lawyers Association named her "Woman Lawyer of the Year."

At Florida Coastal, Hanson increased the law school's graduate employment rate more than 14 percent in the first year, improved student-alumni communications, vastly improved Web services to

students and developed a pro bono program, among many other initiatives.

She taught civil law at UF and the University of Central Florida for 10 years before relocating to St. Augustine. She and her husband, attorney Mike Davis, now are in the process of moving their family to a new home on Lake Elizabeth.

"I have had the opportunity to work with pre-law and law students for over a decade, and I feel privileged to be able to contribute to the development of future lawyers," said Hanson. "I enjoy the students' energy and vitality, and it is so rewarding to help them discover the many opportunities available to them."

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### Word From Iraq Law Student Lohrer E-Mails Home

Think it's hot here? Army Reserve Sgt. Edward Lohrer (2L, right) — a UF law student still serving in Iraq — is withstanding temperatures of 130 to 140 degrees at mid-day. The 27-year-old has been in Iraq since February, and a few weeks ago the thermometer hit a record 151 degrees at his headquarters at Talil Airbase.

"Some of the sand storms here would give Hurricane Andrew a run for his money, and the insects like to bite," Lohrer e-mailed early this week to fellow law student Deb Cupples.

"It seems much more violent and chaotic here now than when the war kicked off," he wrote. "There are trucks loaded with explosives blowing up buildings and checkpoints. Ambushes and sniper attacks on supply convoys. Mortar attacks on U.S. encampments. All this happens on a daily basis."

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### Parking Problems?

- **Set up a car pool** (minimum three riders from in-county or two out-of-county). Purchase only one decal (refunds available for already purchased extras). Each rider also receives three passes per term to drive separately. Spaces always available in large car pool only area. See Mike Oun in Student Affairs for information.
- **Take the bus** (schedules available in Student Affairs). Law students are "pre-paid," and need only show their GatorOne ID. Busses stopping at the law school include number 5, which comes from the Oaks Mall down Newberry Road and SW 2nd Avenue and passes the law school twice an hour; 43, which comes from north 43rd Street, turns on Newberry Road and passes the law school hourly; and 34 — new this fall — which comes from the southwest near Colonial Village, goes east on 35th Place, and comes up 34th Street to SW 2nd Avenue, where it turns west and passes the law school three times an hour.
- **Student parking** also is available in the Cultural Arts area, where busses pick up every six minutes for destinations on Museum Drive and Village or Fraternity Row.

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### Introducing: Michael Allan Wolf

Michael Allan Wolf is the first occupant of the Richard E. Nelson Chair in Local Government Law.

Formerly professor of law and history at the University of Richmond, he has been teaching and writing for more than 20 years in land-use planning, environmental law, property, local government, urban revitalization, and legal and constitutional history.

"So many people have gone out of their way to make my family feel welcome in Gainesville and at the University of Florida. The state and university have grown in many positive ways since I last lived in Florida, and I am excited about joining the outstanding faculty of my home state's premier law school and looking forward to doing my part to help UF achieve its ambitious goals," said Wolf, a Lakeland native. "The Nelson Chair and annual Nelson Symposium will enable me to work closely with several important law school constituencies — including students, faculty, and alumni — as we explore fascinating topics in local government and related fields."

A recipient of the 2001 State Council of Higher Education for Virginia Outstanding Faculty Award and 1992 University of Richmond Distinguished Educator Award, Wolf earned his B.A. (high honors) from Emory University, J.D. from Georgetown University Law Center, and A.M. (history) and Ph.D. (history of American civilization) from Harvard University. He first taught law at Oklahoma City University and has been a visiting professor at the University of Richmond and American University.

Wolf is co-author of *Land-Use Planning* (with Haar) and general editor of *Powell on Real Property* (17 volumes), the most prominent treatise in the area. His work has appeared in a wide variety of law and law-related journals, many of the articles as contributions to symposia on topics in land-use regulation, environmental law, and regulatory takings. His recent publications include "Euclid Lives: The Survival of Progressive Jurisprudence," in the June 2002 *Harvard Law Review* (with Haar), and "Earning Deference: Reflections on the Merger of Environmental and Land-Use Law," in the October 2002 *Environmental Law Reporter*.



### BLSA President Awarded NBI Fellowship

Christopher O'Neal (3L, right), president of the W. George Allen Chapter of the Black Law Students Association (BLSA), has been awarded the National Bar Institute (NBI) African-American Law Student Fellowship.

"The application process required applicants not only to recognize problems in the African-American legal community, but to suggest — and become part of — solutions," said O'Neal. "This fellowship is a great honor, and particularly meaningful to me since I plan to continue working in the black community after graduation and to remain actively involved in the National Bar Association."

According to NBI Grants Committee Chair Freida Wheaton, "Neal's personal story and dedication should serve as a model of success for others."

O'Neal also is executive director of the National Black Law Students Association (NBSA) — the first UF student in that role — and was special assistant to its board in 2002-03. Last April, O'Neal was awarded the Clifford W. Crandall Memorial Scholarship, and in March he was voted BLSA's Male Student of the Year during its annual alumni reunion. He interned for the Commercial Litigation Section of the National Bar Association, which represents more than 20,000 African-American lawyers, judges, educators and law students. A former policeman with more than eight years' experience, O'Neal enjoys criminal law, but is still determining which legal area he would like to specialize in.

### Fall Class Welcomed at Orientation

The Fall '03 Class was welcomed to campus in mid-August by student ambassadors in hard hats (above) and a host of other administrators and faculty who made it their mission to help the new students make their way through the maze of law school rules and regulations and complexities caused by college construction efforts.

"The sessions were excellent and would not have happened without the hard work and contributions of many in the building and some outside it," said Dean Robert Jerry.

Approximately 1,200 students began classes this August, second only to the University of Texas (around 1,470) in *U.S. News & World Report's* listing of top-tier public U.S. law schools. Current estimates for Fall '03 class statistics include: number - 185; Median GPA - 3.65; Median LSAT score - 159, and average age - 25.

Ed works at a supply route security check-point, where he stops suspicious vehicles, redirects civilian traffic and gathers information on military convoys. He also has escorted convoys from Talil to Baghdad, a 13-hour ride through desert heat in a Humvee — the bare-bones military issue and a far cry from the plush, street-ready model popularized by Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Like many military people in Iraq, Lohrer often is a wide-open target.

"They don't know who the enemy is or where he'll show up," said his mother, Charlotte Lohrer of Lake Placid. "This scares me."

In April, news coverage of the U.S. invasion of Iraq was pervasive. After President Bush declared an end to major military activity, it began drifting out of the public's mind.

"People need to realize U.S. soldiers are still dying over here, as many as three a day," Lohrer pointed out. "This war is far from over, but many soldiers feel forgotten. There are still 150,000 of us here, and many have no idea when we can come home."

Constant danger aside, he has found his serv-

ice to be the experience of a lifetime.

"I interact with locals, so I'm picking up Arabic and learning about the culture. I've seen the Tigris and Euphrates rivers and Saddam's palaces. I've been all over Baghdad and seen ancient and biblical landmarks, including the City of Ur, which was built 6000 B.C.," he explained.

When Lohrer left Gainesville in February, he was three weeks into his fourth semester of law school. So far, he has missed two of the program's six required semesters and may miss a third. Also left behind was his part time job at the Gainesville law firm of Fisher & Butts.

"It looks like I'll be here for the long haul," Lohrer concluded. "I'm glad to serve my country, but I also look forward to coming home and resuming my life."

### 'Returned' E-Mail

If you receive "Returned E-Mail" notices for messages you did not send or which were refused or returned because the message contained a virus, it almost certainly did not automatically originate from your computer and you need not be alarmed. Please ignore and delete these messages. The college's Computing Services area does not need to see them.

"We are being deluged with 'Returned Mail' e-mail messages," said Computing Services Head Mark Bergeron. "They result from a new virus that specifically attacks Microsoft Outlook and Outlook Express users. It uses the Outlook address book of the infected computer to send itself to others by 'spoofing' both the 'From:' and 'To:' e-mail address. It cannot read GroupWise address books, however, and the college has installed virus patches. Be sure you have downloaded the latest Virus updates from your Anti-Virus provider for your home computers."

According to Director of Admissions & Special Programs Lewis Hutchison, deciding factors for most students relate to what candidates perceive will be their quality of life and sense of belonging and connection with the law school and other law students. Current law students are the best qualified to help candidates evaluate the Levin College of Law on this more personal level, catering to factors potential students think are most important.

In addition to the meaningful aspect of serving on the Student Recruitment Team, some members will be given the opportunity to travel to cities around the state to assist in recruiting efforts. Prospective students are more relaxed when they see a law student behind the recruiting table,

and are more likely to believe the information they receive, since they view the students as being more honest and not part of "the system."
