Applications from highly qualified students to our J.D., LL.M. and S.J.D. programs increase each year. We have expanded our Graduate Tax Program, which is consistently regarded as one of the nation’s best and now offers the LL.M. in International Taxation and the S.J.D. in Graduate Taxation in addition to the LL.M. in Graduate Taxation. Our highly regarded Environmental and Land Use Law Program now offers the nation’s first LL.M. in these closely-related fields.

We concluded a \$25-million expansion and renovation project in 2005 that added two classroom towers and completely renovated and upgraded our library, and construction is now underway on the \$6-million Martin H. Levin Advocacy Center, which will house a state-of-the-art courtroom and complete the total recon-

struction of the college’s academic space during this decade.

The generous support of our alumni and friends has helped us pass the halfway point in our \$47-million capital campaign, and along with tuition devolution was instrumental in allowing us to continue our progress despite Florida’s tight budget climate.

Recent guests to our campus have included U.S. Supreme Court Justices Sandra Day O’Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg and former Secretary of State Madeline Albright, and this fall we will be honored with visits by both U.S. Supreme Court Chief Justice John G. Roberts, Jr. and U.S. Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens.

Greater than all this is our pride in our faculty, the heart of our institution, whose exceptional productivity and vibrant scholarship are chronicled in this report.

## The UF Law faculty has been a leader in shaping academic thought and public policy.

### EXAMPLES INCLUDE:

- Faculty papers have influenced national and international policy. Professor Patricia E. Dilley’s proposal on “Restoring Old Age Income Security for Low Wage Workers” won one of 12 Rockefeller Foundation Innovation Awards of \$30,000 to strengthen social security for vulnerable groups; Professor Alyson C. Flournoy co-edited “CPR for the Environment: Breathing New Life into the Nation’s Major Environmental Statutes, A Legislative Sourcebook of Progressive Ideas” (2007), which was distributed to members of Congress and staff; and Professor Michelle S. Jacobs was a contributing author to the *U.N. Shadow Report* (U.S. Human Rights Network Committee for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination).

## BUILDING

New Advocacy Center  
Under Construction

On the heels of a major facilities expansion in 2005, construction began this summer on the Martin H. Levin Law Advocacy Center, the core of a \$6-million construction project that will expand legal advocacy education and provide state-of-the-art trial facilities for the college. The impressive stand-alone 20,000 sq. foot center will boast a two-story grand foyer and glass entry with an open staircase that will rise south of Bruton-Geer Hall. It will house a fully functional trial and appellate courtroom on the first floor with a 98-seat gallery, bench for seven judges, a jury box and attorneys' tables. The courtroom also will accommodate judges' chambers and a jury deliberation room.

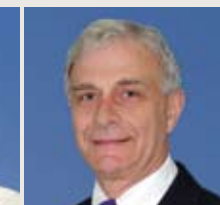

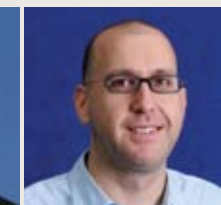

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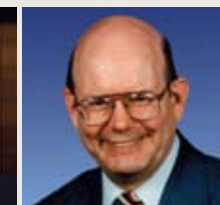

**ADMINISTRATIVE LAW**

“I always tell students on the first day of my Administrative Law course that this will likely be the most boring, complicated, and abstract class they’ll take in law school — but perhaps the most important of all, given the size of our federal, state, and local administrative state. I try to share my strangely obsessive joy about the subject in my scholarship and teaching, and I think by the end of the semester most of my students view the course as challenging but fascinating, and maybe even a little fun. No other subject in law school deals with a part of the government that is so seemingly lawless and so integral to our health and well-being and so crucial to the world around us. My own research asks how our administrative process can best balance our need to inform the public effectively of government actions against the need for government to operate effectively, and how constitutional rights of property and due process limit, but don’t cripple, government’s authority to regulate and create regulatory procedures.”

### Nation’s First Environmental and Land Use Law LL.M.

In a world grappling with critical shortages of water, increasing developmental pressures and the unknown but real threats of climate change, environmental and land use law policies and applications are changing almost as fast as the weather. To prepare a new generation of environmental lawyers to meet these challenges, the University of Florida Levin College of Law now offers the Master of Laws (LL.M.) in the closely-combined fields of environmental and land use law.

The LL.M. program will educate students on the historical and legal underpinnings of environmental and land use law policies, and will encourage them to think creatively to innovate solutions to pressing environmental and related social issues. A major strength of the program is the diversity of faculty, which has expertise in a wide array of fields, including water law, international trade, land use law, natural resources law and others.

In addition, the LL.M. program is unique in that six of the 26 required credit hours must be from relevant courses that have substantial non-law content — either offered outside the Levin College of Law or jointly by the law school and another department.
