FEATURED AT LEVIN COLLEGE OF LAW IN MARCH/APRIL 2005**

REBECCA TSOSIE : MARCH 11, 2005

Arizona State University College of Law

Lincoln Professor of Native American Law & Ethics
Executive Director, ASU Indian Legal Program
Affiliate Professor, American Indian Studies Program



Specializes in Indian law, property, bioethics and critical race theory, and recipient of American Bar Association's "2002 Spirit of Excellence Award." She is author of articles on cultural resources, environmental policy and cultural pluralism, and is co-author of federal Indian law casebook: *American Indian Law: Native Nations and the Federal System*. A graduate of the UCLA School of Law, Tsosie clerked for Chief Justice Stanley G. Feldman of the Arizona Supreme Court before working with the intellectual property firm of Brown & Bain, P.A. She joined the ASU law faculty in 1993, and serves as a Supreme Court Justice for Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation.

BARBARA A. KNUTH : MARCH 18, 2005

Cornell University

Professor and Chair, Department of Natural Resources



As co-leader of Human Dimensions Research, Knuth is studying attitudes and behaviors related to natural resources/environment and possible integration of social and ecological information in natural resources and environmental management decision-making. She also is examining factors influencing human stewardship and the use of natural resources, and community-based natural resource management approaches. Her Ph.D. is from Virginia Tech, and she earned a B.A., B.Phil. and M.En from Miami (OH) University. Knuth has written extensively on environmental and natural resources planning, management and policy processes.

WENDY E. WAGNER: MARCH 25, 2005

University of Texas

Professor of Law



Leading authority on use of science by environmental policymakers and one of seven attorneys serving on the American Bar Association's National Conference of Lawyers and Scientists. Before entering academia, she worked with the U.S. Departments of Justice (Environment and Natural Resources Division) and Agriculture (Office of the General Counsel). Prior to joining the UT law faculty, she taught at Case Western Law School where one of her scholarly pieces was named one of the five best environmental law articles of 1995. Both her Masters in environmental studies and her J.D. are from Yale, and her undergraduate degree from Hanover College.

JAMES SALZMAN : APRIL 8, 2005

Duke University

Professor of Law



An international scholar in natural resources and environmental law and policy, Salzman joined Duke School of Law in 2004 after almost 10 years at Washington College of Law, American University. He has been a visiting professor at Yale, Harvard, Stanford, Macquarie (Australia) and Lund (Sweden) universities; McMaster Fellow and Fulbright Senior Scholar in Australia, 2002-03; and a 2004 fellow at Bren School of Environmental Science & Management, University of California - Santa Barbara. Salzman is an editor of *Environmental Impact Assessment*; and since 1996 has been principal liaison for the Trade & Environment Policy Advisory Committee. His B.A. *magna cum laude* is from Yale, and his J.D. *cum laude* from Harvard.
