### Course Materials

The assigned casebook for the course is Ascher, Clark, McCouch & Murphy, Gratuitous Transfers (6th ed.) (West 2013). Students should also have a copy of the Florida Statutory Supplement and handout problems, which will be posted on the course website (TWEN). Supplementary background readings (optional, not required) are McGovern, Kurtz & English, Principles of Wills, Trusts and Estates (concise hornbook) (2d ed.) (West 2011), and Haskell, Preface to Wills, Trusts and Administration (2d ed.) (Foundation 1994).

#### Course Objectives

The primary objective of the course is to introduce students to fundamental concepts and doctrines of inheritance law, including intestate succession, wills, and trusts. The course provides an essential grounding for students who wish to pursue advanced courses in fiduciary administration, future interests, and estate planning, as well as a general survey for students who intend to practice in other areas.

#### Class Meetings and Attendance

Class will meet in Room 355C at 1:00–2:10 p.m. on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, beginning Wednesday, January 10. Regular and punctual class attendance is required. A student with more than four unexcused class absences may be penalized in the final grade or excluded from the course. Students should be prepared to discuss the assigned readings in class, and may expect to spend up to two hours of preparation for every class hour.

### Topical Outline

Topics will be covered in the following order, with assigned reading in the casebook and the Florida Statutes as indicated. The assigned reading for the first week of class is Chapter 1 of the casebook (pp. 1-55).
