Course Objectives:

- 1 Introduce the student to job-ready agricultural policy issues related to land use and natural resource management in the production of food, fuel and fiber.
- 2. Provide the student with networking opportunities within the agricultural sector.
- 3. Enhance student employment opportunities within the agricultural sector by introducing students to regulatory matters related to land use and natural resource management.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Expectations for student learning outcomes in this course include:

- 1. A knowledge and understanding of key agricultural policy issues and the implementation of those policies through law and regulation.
- 2. An analysis and reasoning of current agricultural policy as influenced by the historical evolution of agricultural law and regulation within the agricultural sector.
- 3. Practice proper and ethical standards in dealing with farm and ranch clients and agricultural policy formulators at the state and federal levels of government.
- 4. Through instructor and guest lectures, provide the student with job ready skills for use in private and government agricultural legal practice.

Method By Which Students Will Be Evaluated and Their Grade Determined:

The final exam is scheduled for Friday, November 30th from 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM. When available the room number will be announced. The two hour exam will consist of multiple choice and short answer essays. Class participation accounts for 20% of the student's final grade. Office hours will be held through Tuesday, November 21st in both the Colleges of Agriculture and Law. If you cannot make office hours, I will accommodate your schedule. Students will supply their own examination blue books.

Class Attendance Policy:

Law school attendance policy follows guidance of The American Bar Association (ABA) requiring the instructor to confirm student class attendance. As such, roll will be taken and absences recorded. As suggested by ABA guidance, students should be ineligible for course credit with class absences in excess of 15%.
