#### **Course description and objectives**

Under the supervision of the clinic director, students in the Environmental and Community Development Clinic work on contemporary legal problems in the fields of land use, local government, community economic development, and environmental law. Completing clinic projects will challenge students' problemsolving, legal research and writing, and public presentation skills.

#### Student learning outcomes

As a law clinic, the Environmental and Community Development Clinic does not have consistent assessments across semesters. I will not even assess all students identically in the same semester. Nonetheless, I will strive to teach you and to assess your proficiency in certain skills. At the end of the course, you should be able to—

- account for time spent working on clinic projects;
- compose professional correspondence;
- create legal memoranda;
- draft legislation;
- track a bill during a legislative session;
- research case law and legislation;
- research non-law subjects related to the policy of clinic projects;
- · solve problems using knowledge of public policy and the law;
- speak to a decision-making body or professional audience; and
- write professional memoranda for a lay audience.

#### Required reading materials

I do not require you to have access to any specific text for this course. I will assign you readings throughout the semester and will use Canvas to provide those materials to you.

Please be sure to register for the course Canvas page and have any required materials available to you during class. You are responsible for checking the Canvas page on a regular basis for any class announcements or adjustments.

#### Course expectations and grading evaluation

I will assign you a grade of "S" (satisfactory) or "U" (unsatisfactory) based your performance in this class. The college will not calculate this grade in your grade point average. I will assess your performance on three criteria: participation in clinic meetings, working the required minimum number of hours, and performance on assigned tasks.

Participation in clinic meetings	You attend scheduled class meetings, including one-on-one or small-group meetings with instructor. You are prepared for scheduled meetings and participate in discussions.
Working the required minimum number of hours	You timely submit weekly timesheets. You work 127.5 or more hours in semester. You work at least 85 hours for clients other than Levin College of Law.
Performance on assigned tasks	You diligently complete tasks I assign. You incorporate my feedback into your work. Your work is professional and meets other standards I set.

#### Class attendance policy
