Welcome to *Intro to U.S. Law*! This document provides an overview of the course and its learning objectives, university policies, and a topical outline that details our work together over the six weeks of this course.

Course Description: This course will provide students an overview of U.S. Law. This course is not meant to offer an in-depth study of any one area; instead, the goal of the course is to offer a comprehensive overview of many different areas of American law. This course is not a substitute for any juris doctorate level course and does not prepare students for taking any portion of the bar exam.

- 1. Explain the history and structure of the U.S. legal system (including federalism and the dual court system).
- 2. Describe the U.S. Constitution, its limits and powers, and key concepts of Constitutional law.
- 3. Summarize the function of U.S. Federal Courts in the area of common law reasoning and statutory interpretation.
- 4. Explain foundational concepts of public law, including criminal law, civil rights and civil liberties.
- 5. Identify basic principles of private law, including torts and contracts.
- 6. Read and digest judicial opinions and statutes.
