MEETING TIME: Weekly live sessions will be held on Thursdays from 7-8 pm. For the first three weeks of class, and the week of Thanksgiving, lectures are prerecorded and are available through links on Canvas. During those weeks, we will use our live sessions for Q and A. For the remainder of the semester, lectures will be delivered live during Thursday class time. If you cannot attend the live sessions, I will be recording and posting them on Canvas. You must complete all the materials no later than the last day of the term. Links to live sessions are available on Canvas.

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

In this course, we will explore the nonprofit and private foundation sector. There are close to 2 million tax-exempt organizations in the US, including some of the largest charities, hospitals, and universities, as well as small private foundations and community organizations. We will look at the sector by examining the life cycle of a nonprofit, from its organization through its ending, and look at both state nonprofit corporation law and federal tax law.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

At the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Understand the state and federal law surrounding the creation, operation, and dissolution of nonprofit organizations
- Apply state and federal law to issues faced by nonprofit organizations
- Analyze and evaluate nonprofit activities (including commercial and fund-raising activities) to determine their feasibility and appropriateness
- Develop policies and plans, which comply with law and the needs of the organization, for nonprofit organizations
- Create a new nonprofit organization that is eligible for IRC \$501(c)(3) tax exemption and plan for the appropriate dissolution of the organization

REQUIRED READING MATERIALS:

COURSE EXPECTATIONS AND GRADING EVALUATION:

This course is presented as 9 modules (Plus an introduction module). Each module contains a combination of video lectures, live lectures and discussions, reading assignments, quizzes, written assignments and discussion posts. Once you complete all the material for one module, the next one will be available to you. The modules vary somewhat in time and complexity. In addition to your day-to-day work, you will also have a final exam. You will be graded as follows: 75% weekly quizzes, discussion post and other assignments; 25%- final exam. Weekly assignments and quizzes are worth 5-15 points, and each point value is listed on Canvas.

CLASS COMPLETION:

To earn a passing grade in the class, you are required to complete all the modules. Content for each Module will be available beginning on the Sunday of that week, and the assignments need to be completed by the following Sunday. The final will be comprised of essay and multiple-choice questions. You may take it at any time during the last week of classes and will incorporate concepts from the entire semester. The final will be released on December 5, 2025, and you will have one week to complete it.
