COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

Welcome to Trademark Law! In this course, we will discuss the law and policy of trademarks, unfair competition, and related topics. The course will begin by covering key concepts underlying the protection of trademarks and the basic requirements of a protectable mark. We will then cover topics such as use, registration, and loss of trademarks; enforcement of trademark rights and defenses to infringement; unfair competition; and remedies.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Understand the policy underlying state and federal trademark and unfair competition law;
- Understand the connections between trademarks and various forms of unfair competition; and
- Apply the law and policy of trademark and unfair competition law to novel factual scenarios.

REQUIRED READING MATERIALS

COURSE EXPECTATIONS AND GRADING EVALUATION

Attendance, preparation, and participation are vital not only to your own understanding of the material but to your classmates' as well. The class will be divided into groups, with each group on call for a designated class on a rotating basis. Although you are expected to have completed the reading for each class, it is particularly important that you are prepared when your group is on call. I encourage you to volunteer even when your group is not on call.

Students will be evaluated based upon class participation and a final exam. The final exam is worth 80% of your grade. The remaining 20% of your grade is based on class participation. Factors that influence your participation grade include preparedness when called upon, willingness to volunteer in class discussions, attendance, and activity in class exercises.

CLASS ATTENDANCE POLICY

Regular attendance is required. If you will be absent from class, or unprepared on a day that your group is on call, please email me in advance to let me know. You will have two free passes over the course of the semester; after that, absence or lack of preparation will negatively affect your participation grade. Viewing class recordings later does not count as attendance. A student who fails to meet the attendance requirement will be dropped from the course.
